

From the Vicar

The month of January begins each year, and with this new beginning, we attempt to put all of the troubling memories from the previous twelve months away and make resolutions as to how we will change ourselves for the better.

The origin of the month's name is derived from the ancient Roman god Janus, who was said to have two faces, one turned to the past, one turned to the future. The Romans apparently felt this was appropriate for the first month of their calendar. The website etymonline.com has this to say about Janus:

[An] ancient Italic deity, to the Romans the guardian god of portals, doors, and gates; patron of beginnings and endings, c. 1500, from Latin *Ianus*, literally "gate, arched passageway," perhaps from PIE root ***ei-** "to go" (cognates:

Sanskrit *yanah* "path," Old Church Slavonic *jado* "to travel"). He is shown as having two faces, one in front the other in back (they may represent sunrise and sunset and reflect an original role as a solar deity). His temple in Rome was closed only in times of peace. Related: *Janian*.

(Etymology is the study of word origins.)

Pass the syrup — it's Shrove Tuesday!

Coming this February 17th

Celebrated the day before Ash Wednesday, Shrove Tuesday (also called “Pancake Tuesday” or “Pancake Day”) is the final day before the 40 day period of Lent begins. This year it falls on February 17 starting at 5:30.

Its name comes from the Germanic-Old English word “shrive,” meaning absolve, and it is the last day of the liturgical season historically known as Shrovetide. Because it comes directly before Lent, a season of fasting and penitence, this was the day that Christians would go to be “shriven” by their confessor.

Shrove Tuesday also became a day for pre-fasting indulgence. In particular, the need to use up rich ingredients such as butter, milk, sugar and eggs before Lent gave rise to the tradition of eating pancakes on this day. www.episcopalchurch.org/dfms/pass-the-syrup-its-shrove-tuesday/



Ash Wednesday



Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent in the Episcopal Church, characterized by the imposition of ashes as a sign of penitence and mortality.

Significance of Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent, a 40-day period of reflection, penitence, and preparation for Easter. It is observed by many Christians, including Episcopalians, who participate in the ritual of receiving ashes on their foreheads. This practice serves as a reminder of human mortality and the need for repentance. Ash Wednesday is observed as a fast in the church year of the Episcopal Church. The Ash Wednesday service is one of the Proper Liturgies for Special Days in the Book of Common Prayer (p. 264). The ashes, typically made from burning the previous year's Palm Sunday fronds, are applied in the shape of a cross while the words, **“Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return,”** are spoken.

Observance and Rituals

During Ash Wednesday services, worshipers gather for a liturgy that includes prayers, readings, and the imposition of ashes. The ashes symbolize both penitence and the acknowledgement of one's mortality, linking participants to generations of Christians who have engaged in this ancient ritual.

Conclusion

Ash Wednesday serves as a profound reminder of the themes of mortality and repentance, inviting Episcopalians and other Christians to enter the Lenten season with a spirit of reflection and renewal. EPIPHANY'S FAVORITE RECIPES

Creamy Wild Rice Soup

Contributed by Ginny Bauer

Ingredients:

1 package Shore Lunch Premium Soup Mix Creamy Wild Rice
4 cups Whole Milk
5 cups Chicken Stock
2 tbsp Oil
1 cup Onions, chopped
½ cup Celery, finely chopped
1 ½ cups Mushrooms, chopped
3 cups Ground Turkey
¼ tsp ground Thyme
Salt and Pepper to taste



Directions:

- 1) In a medium non-stick skillet, heat vegetable oil and brown the turkey. Set aside.
- 2) Add the vegetables to the skillet and lightly brown.
- 3) In a large saucepot over medium heat add the milk, chicken stock and thyme. Bring to a boil.
- 4) Stir in the soup mix, turkey, and cooked vegetables.
- 5) Simmer uncovered until done, about 25 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Notes:

- ◆ Shredded Turkey or Chicken or almost any meat can be substituted for the ground turkey.
- ◆ You can add your favorite vegetables (carrots, potatoes, greens).
- ◆ You can also add any seasonings you like to go with the meat you choose.
