

From the Vicar

This year, we will be reviving a custom from several years ago, the Harvest Festival. Some in the congregation will remember this weeks-long event was based on the harvest festivals celebrated in England in the past. It was a celebration of successful harvest,

when farm families would bring their excess vegetables and fruit to church, where the food was distributed to the needy.

I first learned about the history of the Harvest Festival earlier this fall, when I received a phone call from the Rev. Denson Freeman, who served as vicar at Epiphany several years ago. He asked me if we still held the annual Harvest Festival. I had to admit that not only did we not, I didn't even know that we ever had. Certainly not since I have been in Crestview.

In talking with some of the long-time members of Epiphany, I learned that the festival originated with the women of the church who were from England. As some of you know, at one time, Epiphany had almost a dozen English ladies in the congregation who brought many traditions from the "old country" to our Southern community.

In any event, Father De (as he was affectionately known while serving at Epiphany), explained he had carried the idea of a harvest festival with him when he served Episcopal churches in Colorado and currently at St. James in Fairhope. It was a successful event at both places, and he wanted to share it with me in case Epiphany no longer celebrated a harvest festival.

Father De sent us a package outlining the Harvest Festival at St. James. This year, the festival kicked off with an in-gathering of food (obviously from the store, as there are, few if, any farmers at St. James) during a "Church of England Mass for the Harvest Festival" on Sunday, September 28, with the theme "First Fruits, First Love."

The parish's annual stewardship campaign ties in with festival over the next few weekends, with an in-gathering of pledges from the St. James congregation planned for October 22. The point of the theme "First Fruits, First Love" is to observe the Christian message that we offer our best to God, not our leftovers.

I presented the idea of renewing the Harvest Festival at Epiphany to the vestry, which endorsed the idea. Our Harvest Festival will be a little different, because we are getting a later start. We will kick off our festival on November 9. We will also celebrate the "Church of England Mass for the Harvest Festival" at the end of the campaign on November 23, with both the in-gathering of food to be shared with those in need and the in-gathering of our pledges. This ties in with the American tradition of celebration of the harvest with Thanksgiving.

I hope all of you will join this celebration of the Harvest Festival and share your first fruits with those in need, as well as supporting the work of our church family in this community and beyond.

Property Report for October

The following are the projects that we have been working on; some have been completed, some are still in work, as well as some new projects requiring attention.

Completed

- Several burned out light bulbs were replaced in the hanging lights in the church nave.
- Inspected, cleaned up and organized the church's garden hoses.
- Replace inoperative light fixture in the garage shed with a new fixture.
- Plants at the entry of the church and under the sign are now being watered twice a week.
- The church's riding lawn mower completely repaired and operational.
- Reorganized material in the small shed.

In Work

- The handrails on the handicap ramp and front steps still need to be replaced with sturdier handrails.
- The new doors on St. Joseph Hall and the Garage Shed will be painted will be painted soon as the weather is now cooperating.
- The additional handicap pad is still being researched and bids requested to determine the cost and acquire the funding needed to complete it.
- The kneelers in the choir pews need repair.

New Projects

- Three church pews need the seats reupholstered.
- We are researching to build a chain link fence on north west side of the property.

ALL SAINTS'

On November 1, we remember and honor all the saints, known and unknown, who have gone before us and are in heaven with God. We recognize our shared unity with them, the Church Triumphant.

What does 'All Saints Day' Mean

One of the most moving commemorations on the Church Calendar is the Feast of All Saints. We will celebrate All Saints this year on Sunday, November 2 (although the official date for this feast is November 1).

According to the Episcopal Church's *Lesser Feasts and Fasts*, which is a supplement to the *Book of Common Prayer*, All Saints came into being out of a need for Christian people "... to express the intercommunion of the living and the dead in the Body of Christ." In other words, All Saints is a reminder that through Baptism into the death and resurrection of Christ Jesus, we who are alive in this life are still connected with, in communion with, our loved ones who have died and are now in the direct presence of God.

Since the living and the dead are still connected in Christ, the liturgy on that day will include a necrology, special prayers for those in our community who have died in the previous year. These prayers are rooted in the Church's observance of All Faithful Departed.

Because of what All Saints means, it is a Principal Feast of the Church. It is also one of the four observances on the Church Calendar when Holy Baptism is especially appropriate (along with the Baptism of our Lord, the Easter Vigil, and Pentecost).

Thanksgiving Day

Thanksgiving Day is celebrated in the United States on the fourth Thursday in Nov. This custom is based on the celebration of three days of prayer and feasting by the Plymouth, Massachusetts, colonists in 1621. There was also a Thanksgiving celebration with prayer by members of the Berkeley plantation, near what is now Charles City, Virginia, in 1619. The first national Thanksgiving Day was celebrated in 1789. Under President Abraham Lincoln, Thanksgiving Day came to be celebrated annually on the last Thursday of Nov. However, Thanksgiving Day was celebrated on the third Thursday of Nov. in the three years 1939-1941 under President Franklin D. Roosevelt. The Thanksgiving Day commemoration was moved back to the fourth Thursday in Nov. by Congress in 1941.

Thanksgiving Day is a major holy day and a national day listed in the Book of Common Prayer calendar of the church year (pp. 16-17, 33). The Proposed Prayer Book of 1786 included "A Form of Prayer and Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for the Fruits of the Earth, and all the other Blessings of his merciful Providence." The first American Prayer Book (1789) replaced the four national days of the 1662 English book with propers for Thanksgiving Day. The collect for Thanksgiving Day gives thanks to God the Father for the fruits of the earth in their season and for the labors of those who harvest them. It asks that we may be faithful stewards of God's great bounty, providing for our own necessities and the relief of all who are in need (BCP, p. 246). www.episcopalchurch.org/glossary/thanksgiving-day/

EPIPHANY'S FAVORITE RECIPES

Crock Mock Lasagna

Ingredients:

- 1 12oz pkg lasagna noodles, broken in pieces OR shells or other pasta
- 1 lb. Ground Beef
- ½ lb. Italian Sausage
- 1 Onion, chopped
- 1 Garlic Clove, minced
- 12 oz Mozzarella Cheese, grated
- 1 12oz carton Cottage Cheese
- 2 6oz cans Tomato Paste
- ½ cup Water
- 1 tbsp dried Basil or Italian Seasoning
- Salt and Pepper to your taste

Directions:

- Brown meat and drain.
- 2. Add the onion and garlic to the meat.
- 3. Place the mixture in a greased crockpot Place in greased crockpot.
- 4. Add remaining ingredients, and mixing well.
- 5. Cook on Low for 7-8 hours, or on for Hi 3-5 hours.
